

In alignment with this change, the activities and funding outlined in this report encompass all of February 1st, 2023 - March 31, 2024.





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
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Mission

Survivor's Hope Crisis Centre Inc. (SHCC) provides support and services to individuals residing in the Interlake-Eastern region of Manitoba who have experienced acts of sexual violence, as well as to secondary victims of sexual violence. We recognize that acts of sexual violence are motivated by power inequalities, therefore our work also addresses social and systemic root causes of gender-based violence to create greater change to public ideology, policies, politics, and procedures.



Survivor's Hope Crisis Centre is honoured to work on Treaty 1,3 and 5 and the homeland of the Métis Nation. We acknowledge the relationships that were formed in these territories through Treaties and Ceremony was intended to be one of respect, reciprocity, and renewal.

Sexual Assault Recovery and Healing (SARAH) Program

The SARAH program provides long-term counselling to survivors of sexual violence who are 13 and older and/or to those who care about them. Not pictured are our ten dedicated SARAH workers, who volunteer their time to provide crisis support to individuals of all genders who are seeking services following an experience of sexual violence.

Sexual Assault Discussion Initiative (SADI) Program

SADI is an education and prevention program whose facilitators provide workshops to grade 6 - 12 students on healthy relationships, self-esteem, internet safety, and exploitation.

Reaching Out

The Reaching Out program bridges gaps between communities by providing resources, facilitating presentations, and attending events to build knowledge and connect individuals to our services.

A Year in Review



SARAH

Crisis & Counselling

“Offering hope and validation to those affected by sexual violence”

This year, the SARAH program expanded its availability to sit with survivors and provide acute care in crisis situations, as well as long-term individual counselling and healing groups, with the addition of SARAH Wellness Coordinator, Melanie Wood, and 12 new volunteers joining the crisis team.

New opportunities in the SARAH program included the “Aki Nindoondawaa - I Heard it From the Land” land-based healing project and providing 24/7 support during the 2023 Winnipeg Folk Festival.



SARAH Counsellors held drop-in counselling hours throughout the year in various locations in Selkirk, Beausejour, and Stonewall. These low-barrier sessions allowed individuals the opportunity to meet the SARAH counsellors and built trust, prior to engaging in long-term counselling.

SADI & Mentorship

"Preparing youth for strong, healthy and respectful relationships"

The SADI Program continued to forge connections with youth in existing and new regional schools, adapting workshops to meet the unique needs of students and increasing engagement with new activities, games, and applications. Students benefit from these consistent relationships across their schooling career, growing confident in their ability to disclose harms to SADI facilitators as trusted, external community members.

The Mentorship program pivoted this year to support the development and growth of Queer Straight Alliance groups through various Eastern schools, bringing them together for periodical yearly events, creating greater feelings of inclusion and acceptance for Queer youth.

Reaching Out

“Engaging communities, empowering individuals and equipping a safer world for all”

The Reaching Out program facilitated the growth of the agency this year, increasing public knowledge of Survivor’s Hope and sexual violence services available in the region, by focusing on attending community events and festivals throughout the region and in Winnipeg, including Gimli Icelandic Festival, Pinawa Birthday & Community Garage Sale day, International Overdose Awareness Day, and various job, volunteer, and social justice fairs and wellness days.

The “Let’s Talk About SARAH: media campaign furthered visibility for the agency, while working towards reducing stigma experienced by survivors. Spotify, YouTube, radio, newspaper, and paper posters asked “Did You Hear About SARAH?” effectively drawing over 3500 visits to the website landing page.

- Through the North East Regional Stop Sexual Exploitation Committee, the Fall Family Fair in Beausejour connected over 300 people to new community-based mental health services.

- Successful integrations with the Western side of the Interlake region, building new relationships with social service and mental health agencies, RCMP, and hospitals
- Created new SARAH brochures, SARAH Volunteer brochures, SADI brochures, SARAH posters, and updated the Regional Resource Guide




